# **GRANT AWARDS (May-July)**

- The College continued to receive COVID-19 pandemic relief funding in May and June from both state and federal agencies.
  - The Childcare Restoration Grants Program, part of the Illinois Business Interruption Grants (BIG) program administered by the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, allocated \$67,637 to Triton's Child Development Center for pandemic-related expenses incurred during April, May, and June.
  - ✓ The College received an additional \$88,654 from the Governor's Emergency Education Relief (GEER) Fund, which is administered by the Illinois Community College Board. The funding is intended to help higher education institutions enroll and retain students of color, first-generation students, and high-need students who might otherwise not enroll or return to school due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
  - ✓ The U.S. Department of Education allocated the College \$18,374,722 through its Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF III) made available under the American Rescue Plan. Of the total, \$9,251,640 must be allocated to student emergency aid and \$9,123,082 may be used to cover institutional expenses incurred as a result of the pandemic.
  - The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) awarded Triton \$22,314.82 in pandemic emergency relief funds. The award was used to pay for personal protective equipment, disinfection and cleaning protocol training for staff, and certain COVID-19-related cleaning supplies.
- The Illinois Community College Board awarded the College \$713,565 in Perkins V grant funds. Perkins funding supports career and technical education (CTE) programs and activities designed to increase student retention and placement rates; credential, certificate, and degree completion rates; and the number of nontraditional students who participate in and complete CTE programs of study. Areas of the college that received grant funding include business and technology, arts and sciences, health careers and public services, and student affairs.
- The Department of Adult Education received \$125,000 from the Westlake Health Foundation for the Health Careers Scholarship program. This is the second installment of a five-year grant award, which totals \$625,000.
- The Illinois Secretary of State awarded Adult Education \$50,000 to support their Access to Literacy program. The program offers free tutoring services to adults whose reading, writing, and numeracy skills are below the fourth-grade level.

- The Illinois Board of Higher Education awarded \$24,000 to the Department of Career Services to support their Internship Advantage Program, which provides students with apprenticeships and other work-based learning opportunities at local businesses.
- Leyden Township awarded \$3,000 to the Retired Seniors and Volunteer Program (RSVP), which recruits individuals aged 55 years and older to serve as volunteers in a variety of projects and settings in West Suburban Cook and Southern DuPage Counties.
- Triton has partnered with the Calumet Area Industrial Commission (CAIC) and the Chicago Federation of Labor Workforce & Community Initiative (CFL Initiative) on their H-1B One Workforce Grant Program, which is funded by the U.S. Department of Labor. As a subrecipient, Triton will receive up to \$592,167 over four years to recruit students into grant-approved degree and certificate programs that lead to industry-recognized credentials in advanced manufacturing.

#### **STATE**

**Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO)** *Apprenticeship Expansion Program* Deadline: September 15, 2021 Award: \$150,000-\$350,000

The purpose of this grant program is to increase apprenticeship opportunities for historically underrepresented populations, including individuals with disabilities, youth from underserved communities, older workers, citizens returning from incarceration, and workers in jobs that have been severely impacted by COVID-19. Organizations may apply under one of two program options: Apprenticeship Navigators and Apprenticeship Intermediaries. Navigators work directly with businesses to cultivate and launch new apprenticeships while Intermediaries sponsor and/or coordinate apprenticeship programs, work with employers to hire and mentor apprentices, facilitate program development and related technical instruction, and manage other components of an apprenticeship program. Expected outcomes include the number of new apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship programs expanded.
